Students:

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System at institutional level We organize doubt-clearing sessions in phases during the academic year. We also arrange tutorial/remedial classes as per requirement and as such we evaluate the outcomes of learning/teaching mechanism. In our institutional vision assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning process. As a part of empirical educational strategy, the institution has adopted a centralized Continuous throughout the year.

.4.2 - Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, corridors, classrooms etc. Our College ensures proper upkeep of its infrastructure facilities and equipment by carrying out periodic maintenance drive. Teaching and tutorial rooms are regularly cleaned and painted. College takes ceaseless care to ensure hygiene for its staff and students by providing drinking water, clean canteen premises and regular cleaning of washrooms. Institutional inherent tendency to maintain clean and green environment automatically contributes to maintenance of a healthy infrastructure environment. There are caretakers and gardeners appointed for the campus. Our sensitive parts like Conference Room, E-Pathshala, Labs, Smart Classrooms etc have been given dust-free structures. We have a number of committees dedicatedly working towards the initiation and execution of procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing our institutional physical, academic and support facilities, such as laboratories, sports complex, parking area, computers, classrooms, etc. We have Development Committee wherein all matters regarding new construction/extension/infrastructural augmentation are taken for proper deliberations. The Principal is the chairman and the IQAC Coordinator is an invitee member in committee. A proposal is discussed and then taken for approval by the committee. We have purchase committee that finalizes the purchase of any equipment or any educational supporting item through invitation of quotations from agencies.. The Account Section, under the guidance of Bursar, plays a mediation role in purchase. Before purchase of any matter regarding purchase we hold the meeting with concerned departments and as such seek his/her proactive suggestions and proposals. The purchase mechanism is taken into action when textbooks/journals/reference books are purchased. We also involve College Library Committee in the making of decisions. The time to time renovation of sports complex is decided by the Development Committee. We have Building Committee also. When required, a meeting of this committee is held under the chairmanship of the Principal. The committee decides how to maintain existing classroom facilities, increase the number of classrooms and also how to retain the glamour of the campus with environmental-friendly additions. We hire technical supports and service centres/suppliers for the maintenance of computers, printers, photocopiers, machines, projectors, sound system, etc and for the upkeep of conference rooms and smart classrooms. We also hire IT experts for the healthy well-maintained electronic items, specially our Wi-Fi facility. It is to be mentioned that our university has already nominated an off campus senior teacher as University Representative (UR). He attends our meetings of Development Committee, Building Construction Committee, and, after proper agenda wise discussion, approves the unanimously taken resolution/decisions.
